- 10. Public Safety Update The good news is it has been quiet. Talks about week 17. Currently, the Police are not aware of anything happening. They monitor social media channels and other modes, and they are confident that they are prepared but haven't heard of anything happening that weekend. Keeping an eye on a possible beach week in June.

There have been some new larcenies with vehicles and the thieves are smashing windows. Keep your car locked and take all valuables out of them.

Public comment about a business that supplied footage to the police for an incident and the footage is now available online and the public is commenting on that business. Want to make folks aware and figure out how it was leaked. Police replied that after camera footage is used in trial it is public knowledge.

The second comment after an incident on Atlantic, cars were unable to leave the area. The light at 20th Street caused gridlock/chaos. Suggestion to review with engineering how those lights are working.

Question about staffing levels with the Police. Sgt Ball believes they are about 80 short which is better than they were a few years ago. The Chief would like to fill those positions.

SUBJECT: 2025 Summer Season

Greetings, Business Owners and Managers!

The 2025 summer season is upon us and like you, the city is getting ready for the influx of summer guests. The Resort Management Office encourages all businesses to help Atlantic Avenue shine this season! A clean, uncluttered, and welcoming storefront is a compelling invitation to the many feet on the street that pass your doors daily! City code will be enforced in support of a welcoming environment. Please keep the following in mind.

SIGNS

- A maximum of ONE A-frame sign is allowed and must be kept within 3 ft of the business facade.
- Flashing signs are prohibited in windows for public view.
- Coverage of windows on other than Boardwalk businesses shall not exceed 16 square feet.
- Coverage of windows on Boardwalk businesses shall not exceed 10 square feet.
- Signage restrictions for outdoor cafés can be found in the Café Regulations received when approved.
- Temporary signs restricted over 21 days per calendar year. Limit 3 times per year, max of 7 days each.

WASTE

- Bulky waste such as cardboard and pallets must be properly disposed and not left on sidewalks.
- Trash collection period is 6am-10am. Don't Park bins the evening before and do promptly retrieve.

DAILY OPERATION

- Amplification should be turned towards the business and kept at a reasonable volume.
- Merchandise must be kept on private property and not on the public sidewalk.
- Chairs and tables are prohibited on public property unless in a <u>permitted</u> outdoor café.

REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE

- Activity impacting the public right-of-way must be completed by May 1.
- Keep awnings in good appearance.
- Keep exterior lighting in operating condition.
- Keep exterior clean, washed and painted.

Business Professional Occupational License ("BPOL") Small Business Tax Relief

Summary Proposal

Adjust the Business Professional Occupational License ('BPOL") small business tax cap from \$200,000.01 to \$300,000. Return the small business tax cap to the customary 75% ratio of Virginia Beach businesses. This proposal will cut taxes on average by \$722 for 1,278 small businesses and reduce BPOL revenue \$909,067. This proposed reduction in revenue is 36% of the \$2,468,635 average annual growth of BPOL revenue since 2019.

Background

- 1996 The General Assembly passed, and Governor Allen signed legislation to address the high tax rates on BPOL and the inconsistent application of the levy across Virginia. The law mandated consistent administration through a "model ordinance" and a small business tax cap of \$100,000.
- 1997 In Virginia Beach, 75% of businesses qualified for the state mandated small business tax cap of \$100,000.
- In December the City Council increased the small business tax cap from \$100,000.01 to \$200,000 beginning in the 2023 tax year. That \$975,347 adjustment equaled 42% of the \$2,347,605 average annual growth in BPOL revenue from 2019.
- 2023 72% of Virginia Beach Businesses qualified for the small business tax cap of \$200,000.
- 2024 71% of Virginia Beach Businesses qualified for the small business tax cap of \$200,000.

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Personal Property Tax Relief for Elderly and Disabled Taxpayers

Summary Proposal

Revise and update the income and asset limits for Elderly and Disabled taxpayers seeking Personal Property Tax Relief. Increase the annual income limit from \$29,500 to \$52,000 and increase the gross asset limit from \$70,000 to \$195,000. This will expand the benefit to 745 of our most vulnerable taxpayers and reduce the general fund by \$218,389. This proposed reduction in revenue is .03% of the \$8,229,202 average annual growth of personal property revenue since 2019.

Background

- The General Assembly created a separate classification of personal property owned by elderly and handicapped persons. Local governments were not required to adopt this separate classification. If they did, interested taxpayers could apply to the Commissioner of the Revenue and were required to meet the following conditions:
 - Must be 65 on or before December 31 OR- Permanently and Totally Disabled as certified by the Social Security Administration or two (2) doctors.
 - 2. Must not exceed the \$40,000 limit in the annual gross income.
 - Must not exceed the \$150,000 limit in gross assets, excluding the value of a principal residence and up to one (1) acre of land.
- 1994 The City Council adopted a separate classification for personal property owned by elderly and disabled persons and reduced the tax rate from \$3.70 to \$3.00. However, the income and asset limits were set at \$29,500 and \$70,000 respectively, well below the state limits.
- 1998 The General Assembly increased the income and asset limits to \$52,000 and \$195,000 respectively.
- 2022 The City Council reduced the tax rate from \$3.00 to 0.000001, benefiting 923 taxpayers.

ROUTE 30 • ATLANTIC AVENUE TROLLEY

Operates along Atlantic Avenue from 1st Street to 40th Street.

ROUTE 31 • AQUARIUM & CAMPGROUND TROLLEY

Extends to the Virginia Aquarium and Marine Science Center, Ocean Breeze Water Park and KOA Campground.

ROUTE 35 • BAYFRONT TROLLEY

Operates along Pacific Avenue extending from 1st St to Shore Drive, Pleasure House Road and First Landing State Park.
